
The El Paso Scale Model Society

Our club is a chartered chapter of the International Plastic Model Society - U.S. Branch (the IPMS-USA). The EPSMS was first organized in 1969, received its charter in 1970, and has been continuously active since that time.

We are a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting the art of scale modeling (regardless of construction media), and membership is open to anyone interested in scale modeling. Club membership dues are payable on an annual basis (we can accept cash or personal checks). Dues are \$15.00 per year for regular members over the age of 16, and are based on a January-December club year. Junior memberships are available for those aged 16 and under, and are priced at \$5.00 per year. Family memberships are available for an extra payment of \$2.00 per year per family member. Members in good standing are entitled to vote in all club matters, run for office, enter club contests, judge in all club contests, and receive a copy of the club's monthly newsletter. Hal's Hobby Warehouse on Bessemer in East El Paso also offers club members a discount on purchases of models and modeling materials. The exact discount is set on a sliding scale. Our club meetings are generally held on the 1 st or 2nd Sunday of each month at 2.00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of St. Paul's United Methodist Church at 7000 Edgemere Blvd (please see the map below). Schedule changes are published ahead of time in the newsletter. We normally hold either one or two model contests at each club meeting, one against a specific modeling or historical theme, and one that is an open competition for anything a modeler wishes to bring.

Fabian Nevarez had four, yes, four models to display. Fabian had a Ki-43 Hayabusa, and a Ki-44 Shoki both from Hasegawa kits. He had a Me Buchon in Spanish Air Force markings. All of these were in

Alclad II as the major part of the finish. The fourth was a CanadaAir Tutor in Malaysian markings. The Buchon was built from the Academy kit and the Tutor from the Hobbycraft kit. All were in 1/48

th scale. Welcome back Fabian. These are the first aircraft models finished by Fabian in over a year. He is now doing about three a month again, just like in the old days.

Another in-progress model shown at the meeting was Jim Patrick's 1/48th Tamiya P-51 Mustang, complete with invasion stripes and heavy weathering. A very nice looking models that we hope to see finished soon.



Bill Plunk brought his Tamiya 1/48th scale Cromwell Mk IV tank. In last month's GLUE the tank was reported as in progress. It was finished this.

New member Carl Webster had at least 12 models to show. These were all in 1/35th scale. He had four M-113 armored personal carries in four different guises. There were 2 M-48 tanks. One in the Blazer type the other in the A3 type. Another kit was the M998TOW Hummer. He had an Israeli Vulcan diorama and an M-60A1 in USMC markings from Desert Storm. Two others were the Tiran 5, an Israeli T-55 in progress and an Isherman M50 Sherman. Carl is a very enthusiastic modeler and will contribute much to the club.

Dennis Cramer had three early stream engines. The scales he used for these were 1/12th and 1/16th scales. These were all wood and all scratch built. 


This is an outstanding set chocked full of photos and profiles invaluable to the hobbyist or those interested in what is sometimes referred to as 'the greatest tank battle in history'.



Operation Citadel (Unternehmen Zitadelle), as named by the Germans, also known as The Battle of Kursk, was the epic clash between Russian and German forces that occurred in 1943 after the Battle of Stalingrad. For those with an affinity for World War II history, the authors have provided highly readable accounts of the situation, operations planning, orders of battle, tactics, camouflage & insignia and day to day operations including first person accounts. Both hard bound volumes are large and heavy being printed on high quality glossy stock. Volume 1 comprises 495 pages and 702 photographs of men and machines, most never before published. There are 4 color maps and 48 pages of color profiles revealing German formation insignia and vehicles such as Panzer II. III. IV. Sdkfz 250 & 251. Maultier, Wespe, Sturmgeschutz, Panther, Tiger I, Grille, Marder, Hummel, various
