We had fourteen members sign up for the Second Bassett Place Mall Show. This event is to honor the Veteran's in our area and provide models that those that have served would be able to identify as




equipment they might have used or targets they might have seen or destroyed. This is the fifth or sixth year of this event

Jim Davis brought another of his Two of a Kind Series to show. This time he had the PT-17 trainer from Boeing/Stearman in 1/48<sup>th</sup> scale built from the Lindbergh kit and in 1/72<sup>nd</sup> scale he used the Revel kit. Colorful models, both.



Mike King had a Blenheim Mk I built from the old Frog offering in  $1/72^{nd}$  scale. Mike finished it as a Finnish bomber with skis. Another model from Mike was an SNJ-3 based at Alameda, ACA in 1943. Mike used the Heller T-6G and

modified it to SNJ-3 standards. Nicely done.

Mike McCarthy had a 1/144<sup>th</sup> scale B-52 to show as a work in progress. This model will be displayed at the Ft. Bliss Museum as part of a new display. Mike was gracious enough to agree to build it for the display.



Fred Gonzales returned to a meeting after several months' absence with a Tamiya 1/48<sup>th</sup> scale Stug III. Fred used pastels to weather this vehicle. Fred is a long time member and he has won numerous contests with his car models. I would not say that this is his first armor model, but it is the first that I remember him bringing to a meeting.

Our last scheduled public event has held on Sunday, November 15 at the Bassett Place Mall. This was in conjunction with Veteran's Day, November 11.

Eighteen El Paso Scale Model Society members brought an interesting range of models to show. Carl Webster and his son Daniel, Duane Velasquez and Dixi Fischer, Bill and Robert Coster, Joseph Roper, Mike Garcia and his son Kai, Mike Boudreaux and Emily, Roy Lingle, Fred Gonzalez, Mike Kennedy, Michael Drapes, Jim Davis and Jose Patino from Juarez, Mexico all bought models and they were really an outstanding presentation.

John Estes transported the table, covers and the club logo for the event. MJ Kinney, office manager for IPMS/USA took care of our insurance and Marguerite Byers, Marketing Manager for Bassett Place provided us with the venue, once again. We offer our Thanks to all for their efforts and support as this made for an enjoyable event.

The Tread Heads had a great display of 1/35<sup>th</sup> scale armor with some individual pieces and some in Vignette poses plus several dioramas, complete with rubble, tools, and more.

These models took up about 42 square feet of our total display area which was made up of 14, two by eight tables, plus one, two by 6 foot table. Roy Lingle, Carl Webster and Bill Coster provided the armor for this section of the display. Robert Coster had three or four models mixed in with his Dad's efforts.

Jim Davis had an outstanding line up on US Navy trainers from SNJ's to the latest Hawk. Mike Kennedy had a nice selection of models to show also in 1/48<sup>th</sup> scale including a couple as WIP's. Mike Boudreaux added several more outstanding 1/48<sup>th</sup> aircraft on the same section of table. Jose Patino had a number of WW II models also in 1/48<sup>th</sup> scale on the table next to Mike Boudreaux's. Mike Garcia finished the 1/48<sup>th</sup>

aircraft section with several more nice models, including a B-29 with all four engines turning and churning. This area contained about 112 square feet of space or 7 complete 2 by 8 foot tables, plus a wee bit that were covered by Mike Garcia's excellent ship models in 1/35th scale. Kai Garcia had several models displayed in the same section as his dad.

Joseph Roper had a large collection of 1/72<sup>nd</sup> scale tanks and aircraft that covered at least 16 square feet of space.

Michael Drapes had a large number of 1/72nd scale aircraft models to show. Several models were displayed with copies of a 1944 Life Magazine article on U.S. Aces. These models depicted

the particular aircraft mflown by these aces at some time or another. One popular model was his B-24 D assembly ship in bright yellow with polka dots.



Fred Gonzales had a number of  $1/24^{th}$  and  $1/25^{th}$  scale cars, including dragsters, NASCAR and street machine along with some armor pieces in  $1/48^{th}$  scale. This was Fred's first show in a number of years. It was nice to have him back in the groove.

Dixi Fischer, who just happens to work at the museum at Ft. Bliss had some scratch built buildings that were out fitted and a lot of the women shoppers stopped to talk to her about them. Dixi also had some military model in plastic on her table as she versatile in her modeling interest.

Duane Velasquez had 20 plus square feet of helicopters, all in 1/72<sup>nd</sup> scale. These covered a good bit of helicopter history and included some Russian as well as US types.

All in all, a great day talking modeling and enjoying the company of club members with time to talk and really look at the work being presented. All who displayed wanted to do it again. FYI, the dates have already been set for 2011, and will appear in the GLUE in the January edition.
